#### 1.Messages From The Head Teacher

The cherry blossoms are in full bloom in Tokyo. In Japan, the cherry blossom season is when the fiscal year changes, and it is the season of farewells and encounters. On Friday, February 28th, a speech contest was held for graduating students in the Tokyo International University's Ikebukuro campus hall. With the principal watching, the representatives of each class gave a magnificent presentation in front of more than 200 people, and the unity of the class was also seen as they cheered for their representatives. About 60 current students also came to watch the event, so this enthusiasm will surely lead to next year's event.

The graduation exams were completed on Thursday, February 27th, and the graduation ceremony was held on Thursday, March 13th. The ceremony was solemn and moving. Representatives from all classes gave speeches, and there was an award ceremony for those who had studied hard during the school year, represented their classes well, and attended school without an absence.

From this day forward, the graduates will go their separate ways. I hope each of you will steadily progress toward realizing your goals.

On March 14 (Friday), the March test for current students was held, and a conversation test was also held in each class on a separate day. Many students were well prepared for the conversation test, as they had already experienced it at least once.

#### 2.Messages from the Career Counseling Room

On Thursday, March 13th, the 2024 class completed their graduation ceremony and safely departed to pursue their new career paths. As we enter a new semester, there are only about 11 months left until next year's graduation ceremony, and it would be a problem if you hadn't already decided on your future path by then. It's important to plan early and make a good start, rather than taking a year to think carefully.

The Career Guidance Office will provide guidance for a period of one year, or even less than one year, in close contact with the homeroom teacher of each class, based on the following two points: "career guidance" and "individual interviews". If you have any questions, concerns, or frank opinions, please feel free to contact us at any time.

#### **★★**Career guidance★★

We have already held three career guidance sessions, once in January and twice in February, for students who will graduate in March 2026. The topics are "About the one-year exam schedule," "Recommendations for taking the EJU and JLPT exams," and "How to select basic subjects for the EJU." The explanation included a detailed analysis of original examination data compiled exclusively by the Career Guidance Office. In the future, we plan to explain what needs to be done at the right time, just before the time when it is most needed.

#### **★★**Personal interview★★

Since the "Career Guidance" is for all students, it's only a general discussion, so we offer personalized advice daily based on individual situations to those who wish to receive it. The basic policy of the Career Guidance Office

is not to recommend only one school, but to offer multiple schools to students so that they can make their own final decision on which school to apply to. For example, for those hoping to go on to university, the subjects and weighting of exams vary depending on the university, even within the same faculty, so the best school for each individual will be different. Each student is encouraged to think independently based on the information provided, visit schools independently, and take responsibility for deciding which schools to apply to.

Finally, we attach below the comments of this year's graduates for younger students. The comments of all 165 graduates are posted in the school so that everyone can see how the older students have spent their time at the Japanese language school. We will guide them to aim even higher than this year's graduates.

- The teachers were very kind. And the office staff were also kind, so when I had problems with daily life, they
  were able to help me solve them. There is a career guidance room in the school, so you can ask about higher
  education. School life was very fun, and I could take part in many different activities. I'm glad I was able to
  study at the Japanese Language School affiliated with Tokyo International University. (Student from Taiwan)
- You don't need to worry about what to study when you come to Japan, or whether you will be able to study
  properly. If you follow the school schedule, you will be fine. What you do every day will gradually become
  more usable in your daily life, and you will gain confidence and be able to do more, so don't worry, just do
  your best. (Student from Korea)

#### January: "Disaster Prevention Experience for 2024 Fall new students "


















■ Kimono Dressing Club ■

#### OStudent discount certificate and issuance procedures⊖

If you present your student discount certificate, you will receive a 20% discount on JR fares if the one-way commercial kilometres of the section you are travelling on are 101 kilometres or more, so please take advantage of this offer if you are traveling long distances within Japan.

Student discount certificates will be issued by the administration office upon request by students (excluding audit students). If you need one, please fill out the designated form and apply.

Please note that the validity period of the student discount certificate you receive will be within three months from the date of issue. If you graduate or withdraw from the university, you will no longer be able to use the card, even if it is within three months.

If you are planning a trip a little further away, be sure to take advantage of the student discount.

It takes a few days to issue, so please apply in advance. For more information, please contact the school's office.
